SHARING CHRISTMAS JOY

For many people this is a difficult time of year. We have all come through many challenges over this past year. Some of the people we have loved are no longer with us. Some people have faced health challenges, and are on the road to recovery. Some have had changes in their lives that were unexpected, some for good, and some not so much. Even this colder weather brings challenges for many of us. So there is lots to bring us down, or make us frustrated, or take some of the joy out of our day. But we are here. We are still going. We are still a community loving and serving Jesus. And Jesus calls us to serve – the poor, the needy, the hungry, the down-and-out. The amazing thing is that we are energized and realize that it brings as much joy to ourselves as it does to those we help.

Again this year, we have the opportunity to help a group of people who at times are forgotten. People who are alone and no longer have family. People whose life circumstances have changed. We have the chance to make a Christmas for those who live at Pine Villa. For a number of years now we have provided gift bags for those who live there. This is a chance to bring Christmas to them. Through visiting there, I found that there were many who received only what the staff were able to provide. So the ministry to bring joy began.

This year there are 34 residents. There are 20 gentlemen and 14 ladies. Yes, this means 34 pairs of socks, 34 toothbrushes, 34 hats, toques, scarves and mitts. 34 unique things to be stocking stuffers – all presented in gift bags. You might not ever know "who" will be the recipient, but you can be assured that the gifts are appreciated and make a world of difference. Sometimes things like board games are given to the nursing home for all to share. It all makes a difference. If you feel that you could participate this year, think of the things you would appreciate getting, and see what you could come up with to make this group of people feel special. Even combs, shampoo, soap, all show that they matter and that someone was thinking of them. If you can help out, please let Nancy know and if you would choose a gent or a lady. It would be helpful to have the bags brought to the church between the 14th and 18th of December for delivery later that week. If you might not be able to contribute an individual bag, donations of individual items are also helpful – tooth paste, puzzles, puzzle books and such are also helpful. Each gift bag also includes a card on behalf of the congregation, whishing them a Merry Christmas.

I thank you in advance for your continued generosity! It really does make a difference to everyone who lives there.


Sharon Goldsworthy reminds us of the need with the delivery of plants to those people on our pastoral list....

Setting Sail With *Dawn Treader*: Our Chronicles of Narnia Book Study Continues

On November 29th, our parish book study on the Narnia novels of C.S. Lewis met again to discuss the fourth book in the series, *The Voyage of the Dawn Treader* (henceforth referred to here as VDT). Curiously, we met just a week after the sixtieth anniversary of his death (Lewis' passing was somewhat overshadowed by the death of President John F. Kennedy on that same day in 1963).

It took Lewis only three month to write VDT, between Dec 1949 and Feb 1950. That a distinguished and busy academic should write such an engaging children's book in such a short time shows how committed he was to this project, and how much Narnia captured Lewis' imagination.

In VDT, the Pevensie children return to Narnia, though the eldest, Susan, is missing, a foreshadowing of the ending in which Aslan will tell the children that they are now too old to remain in Narnia and so must return to England. In Susan's place is their quite unpleasant cousin, Eustace Scrubb, who "almost deserved" his name. Via a magic picture of a boat on a sea, they find themselves united with Caspian (the Prince Caspian of the previous novel). Now King of Narnia, Caspian has set sail on his ship *Dawn Treader* to find the lost lords of Narnia who were loyal to his father.

Thus the stage is set fo a sailing adventure, a quest which has some things in common with other children's stories about ships and quests, such as *Treasure Island*. It moves between some very charming places (the island with the Magician and the Dufflepuds) to places that are extremely sinister (the golden pond, the dark island where all dreams including night-mares come true).

Ever the scholar, Lewis was drawing on the tradition of Homer's Odyssey and the medieval legends of the voyages of St Brendan.

Brendan was a legendary Irish monk who founded numerous monasteries; according to legend, he and his companions sailed west to an earthly paradise called The Land of Promise and had many adventures along the way.

Among the ship's company is the unforgettable heroic mouse, Reepicheep, who despite his size is an honourable and chivalrous character like D'Artagnan the Musketeer. Reepicheep is determined to journey to the far ends of the seas of Narnia for at his birth a fairy had prophesied that he would "find all you seek, / There in the utter East. Lewis once told a young reader that VDT is about "the spiritual life (especially in Reepicheep)". In another book he wrote that the mouse is not an allegorical figure but that "anyone in our world who devotes his whole life to seeking Heaven will be like Reepicheep". Reepicheep is the only character in VDT who at the end is allowed to remain in Aslan's kingdom.


Eustace Scrubb, a selfish and nasty boy, immediately learns a painful lesson because he thinks of Reepicheep as a sort of pet, and is sharply corrected. Eustace does not yet understand that the Talking Animals of Narnia are wise and should be respected, for they are as loved by Aslan their Lion creator as God loves all his fellow humans.

An important part of VDT is Eustace's own journey to becoming human, for because of his selfishness he falls under an enchantment and wakes as a nasty dragon. Becoming a dragon saves him in a strange way because it shows him the ultimate cost he will pay for alienating himself from others and for despising Narnia. He can't get rid of his dragon self, even though he tries. It is Aslan who appears and peels off Eustace's scaly dragon skin before washing him in a well in a sequence that reminds us of a Christian baptism and which shows

Aslan is not a major character in VDT but he is always there in the background as a spiritual guide, protector, and conscience. In the final chapters the ship comes to the far end of the east sea, to the shore of Aslan's kingdom. Aslan first appears as a snow white lamb beside a meal of cooked fish, a clear reference to John's gospel (Jn 21:9), but he then assumes his familiar lion appearance. As he gently sends the children back to England, they ask him if they will find him there as well, and Aslan replies with these telling words:

"I am [there]", said Aslan. "But there I have another name. You must learn to know me by that name. This was the very reason why you were brought to Narnia, that by knowing me here for a little, you may know me better there."
