Hi Everyone,


With this amazing summer weather we have been having it seems crazy that we are now at the beginning of October!

## Our Parish Journey to Narnia Continues:

#### A Horse And His Boy

Our All Saints book study of The Chronicles of Narnia novels by C.S. Lewis recently met to discuss A Horse and His Boy (HHB). Lewis set this novel in the time described in the final chapter of The Lion, The Witch, and The Wardrobe (LWW), when the four Pevensie children have become Kings and Queens of the magical realm of Narnia.



Unlike LWW, which travels between the "real" world of Lewis' England and the land of Narnia, HHB is set entirely within the world of Narnia. We first meet Shasta, a boy who lives with his cruel fisherman father on the coast of the realm of Calormen. They are visited by a nobleman on a splendid horse, who lodges with them for the night, and Shasta overhears the nobleman bargaining with his father to buy him as a slave.

Fortunately for Shasta, the nobleman's horse is named Bree, one of the Talking Animals of Narnia who was captured and brought to the cruel land of Calormen. Bree and Shasta resolve to both escape to Narnia and freedom, and on their way they meet a noble born girl, Aravis, who is fleeing an arranged marriage to a repulsive and much older man. Aravis also has a Narnian horse, named Hwin. The two young people and their talking horses agree to escape together.

While passing through the Calormen capital of Tashbaan, the four meet the royal Narnians, who are there on an embassy but soon find that they are menaced by the cruel Calormen ruler, the Tisroc. Shasta also discovers that he is a dead ringer for Corin, a companion of the Narnians and a prince of Archenland, a small kingdom allied to Narnia and on its borders. While in Tashbaan, Shasta and Aravis learn that the Tisroc wishes to conquer Archenland and is sending his son, Rabadash, with an army by a secret way.

The second half of the story is thus a race to save Archenland. During their journey north, Aravis and Shasta meet the mighty lion Aslan, the creator and guardian of Narnia, who has been guiding and protecting them all along. Aslan sends Shasta to warn Archenland, and it is saved after a bitter battle, when the Narnians, escaped from Tashbaan, come to raise the siege in the nick of time. Shasta discovers that he is really Cor, Corwin's older twin, and the story ends as all good medieval romances do, with feasting, a wedding (Cor and Aravis) and the hero assuming his rightful kingdom.

HHB thus seems like a simple children's story, and in part it is. Lewis was drawing on his vast knowledge of medieval and renaissance romance and fantasy, while Calormen owes much to The Arabian Nights. However, as our group discovered, it is a surprisingly deep novel.

The motto of "Narnia and the North!" as our heroes ride to freedom reminds us that for Lewis, the journey from exile to our true homeland is of recurring interest (the lion Aslan comes from exile to reclaim his kingdom of Narnia from the White Witch in LWW). The Christian idea of God's people in exile seeking their true homeland is somewhere in the background.

Hwin and Bree, as Talking Animals, like all the good and fantastic creatures of Narnia, make us imagine Creation in a new way. Just as this week's Feast of St. Francis (Oct 4) reminds us that the earth and its creatures are an expression of God's love, likewise Narnia makes us see a world where humans and non-humans live as equals (though Lewis, as a good Englishman, could not resist describing a breakfast where kindly Dwarves feed the famished Shasta with toast and bacon!). Even the title, A Horse and His Boy, makes this point by reversing the order of words that we would expect.

Aslan is always in the background but always a powerful figure, hinting at God's love and providence in guiding the four to their proper home. While kindly, he is also a sometimes stern figure, leading others to self-knowledge so they can take responsibility for their actions and grow into goodness and maturity. Some refuse this opportunity: the cruel Rabadash scorns Aslan's efforts to redeem him, but Aravis, while not born a Narnian, is welcomed into a new and better life. Thus the idea of grace is a central theme for Lewis.

Our next meeting of our Narnian book study will be Wednesday, Oct 25th, at 1:30pm. We will be discussing the next novel in the series, Prince Caspian. Why not get your own copy and join us in this world that seems so deceptively simple and yet which invites us to grow in our own faith?

Sharon Goldsworthy has shared with us, information about a new group being formed at All Saints. Please see her report about this opportunity for the women of our Parish and community.
