#### **Anglicanism 101 Series Starts Next Week**

I am quite excited that our Anglicanism 101 Series launches next week, on October 24th.

This series is an attempt to gather the strengths of our regional clergy team to offer an accessible and informative series of talks on the Anglican tradition within Christianity.

We want to explain the how's and why's of how our faith tradition does things. For example, why is it that our services are so similar to the Roman Catholic Mass, and yet we have women clergy! How did that happen? Was it something to do with Henry VIII and his divorce?

Or, why do Anglicans say that it's ok to believe in the Bible AND believe in dinosaurs and evolution?

This series is for longtime Anglicans who still have questions (I know they exist, and in large numbers!) as well as for folks who may have come to Anglican worship after a long time away, or from other Christian traditions. We hope that this series will be informative for all of you, and we also hope that it may help some prepare for baptism, confirmation, or renewal of their faith.

Our series begins on October 24th as Rev Sharon talks about how and why we worship. Each talk will be offered at 1 pin at Prince of Peace in Wasaga Beach and then again at 7pm here. We will also make video recordings of these sessions and post them online for those who can't attend or who are wintering in warmer climes. We have just celebrated the season of Creation, and we are grateful for the opportunity to worship God in Southern Georgian Bay with all the beauty that surrounds us.

St. Luke's was gifted a donation of school supplies to support children and teens returning to NCPS, Worsley Elementary and Collingwood Collegiate and continue to support the hot lunch program at NCPS.

Our foodbank has increased in families over the summer. We now support 37 families weekly, with donations from Foodland (Creemore and Stayner), 100 Mile Store, YF Patisserie, Creemore Farmer's Market, local beef farmers and Miller Dairy. We are thankful for the support in our community which allows us to provide fresh fruit and vegetables weekly. Thank you to our faithful volunteers who help pack and deliver our donations.

To enrich our worship services we are hoping to learn three new hymns and a canticle before Advent, with the help of Fr. Sharon and her guitar!

Our first Double Toonie lunch will be in October. This is a community event which is held on the last Wednesday of the month. It's wonderful to see friends and neighbours and newcomers enjoy fellowship over a bowl of warm soup!

We continue to be blessed by our Ukrainian friends. Details are being made to have a "learn to make pierogis" day.

The Creemore Coyotes and the Stayner Siskins are having an exhibition game in Creemore November 18. The entry fee will be a donation to the St. Luke's Community foodbank! Thank you to Tom Macham for this initiative. There is wine tasting from 4-5:30 and then the puck is dropped at 7:30 with 3 on 3 or 4 on 4 to make his an entertaining evening for the supporters!

I am presenting a workshop on Rural Poverty for the Social Justice and Advocacy Conference on October 28. This is a morning session, where we will gain understanding and aware-

God is certainly at work at Prince of Peace, Wasaga Beach! In recent weeks the children have been learning about the stories of Joseph and Moses in Genesis and Exodus. We marked the Season of Creation with special liturgies during the month of September.

We finished the season of creation with a Blessing of the Animals, where altogether Rev. Louise Dightam blessed 13 dogs, 2 cats, a rabbit, a turtle and a chicken – both in person and on Zoom!

September brought the restart of Bible study, our potluck dinners, men's group and single ladies lunch, plus we're adding Messy Church and a Spirituality Group for Women to our offerings. A friendly group continues to "walk with Julie" every Monday. Our semi-annual book sale was a great success, with \$1,600 raised and all remaining books going to the penitentiary and charitable organizations, renewing our commitment to keep things out of landfill.

We are looking forward to joining the Anglicanism 101 and Praying into Advent offerings, and extend a warm welcome to the community to join in any of the events coming up at Prince of Peace.

In outreach news, we have restarted our weekly parents and tots program (hosted at the RecPlex), and recently used our "noisy change" to provide school supplies to high school students who are clients of the Wasaga Beach Ministerial Food Bank, where Rev. Louise serves on alternate Thursdays. Our clotheslines of toiletries has been well used over the summer months, and when the weather gets cooler, we will switch to supplying mittens, hats and socks.

The children got an early start on our October food drive by harvesting the potatoes they had planted at our summer VBS camp. The potatoes were donated to the St Luke's, Creemore foodbank.

We continue to invite our community to "Come and See" the great things God is doing at Prince of Peace, and love to welcome guests if you find yourself in Wasaga Beach some Sunday.

### **Introducing Our Saturday Night Eucharist**

Starting on Saturday, November 4th, we are launching a new service, a Eucharist that will run every Saturday at 5pm. The folks behind it are the clergy, Michael and Sharon, as well as Patricia Baldwin, who brings a wealth of wisdom and knowledge of contemplative spiritual practice.

Why are we doing this? We want to offer an option for those parishioners and visitors who may not be able to attend our 09:30 Sunday service. We also want to create a space where we might explore some of the depths of our Anglican tradition.

What will these services be like? These services will be a work in progress. Some will feature periods of silence and space for contemplation. Some will feature simple hymns from the Taize tradition. A few may be more formal, with chanting and perhaps even incense. Short meditations instead of formal sermons. Whatever we do, the eucharist will be at the heart of each Saturday evening service.

Will these services be recorded or streamed? We're thinking not. We want to keep the Saturday evenings simple and in the moment., so no slides, screens, or streams We also want to minimize the demands on our tech crew so they're fresh for Sunday mornings.

Will these services replace Après Ski? Absolutely not. Come the ski season, from January through March, parishioners are welcome to contribute to the food and drink that makes the Après Ski services their own special thing.

What's the goal? The goal is to see if we can sustain a Saturday evening eucharist that offers something a little different from our Sunday practices, while deepening our spiritual lives. Much of the church growth literature agrees that strong churches are ones that focus on nurturing and forming people in their faith lives.
