#### EASTER 2024

#### NEWS FROM THE PARISH OF PRINCE OF PEACE CHURCH

Rev. Louise shares the story of 'Carrying Our Cross to Easter"....her special message for this special time of year. As well, we learn about the exciting things happening at Prince of Peace, in words and pictures!

#### **Carrying Our Cross to Easter**

Jesus told his disciples: If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me. (Mark 16:24)

One Sunday during Lent we invited the children to carry our large, and quite heavy, Good Friday rugged cross. One five-year-old managed to carry it all the way down the aisle. When asked, he insisted it "wasn't heavy." But when his father took the weight of the other end, the child remarked that then the big cross was "really light. Like nothing."

As adults we each carry our cross – a cross weighed down by worries, duties and self-sacrifice. A cross that can feel weighed down by Christ's call to us to be his servants – a call that can sometimes feel overwhelming in our broken world.

And as adults we can get swept up into telling others – and telling ourselves – that our cross isn't heavy. Perhaps, we think, it is not as heavy as other people's. Or not as heavy as it could be. Or not as heavy as it used to be. Or we just don't want to admit to ourselves or others that our cross has become too heavy to bear. And perhaps we proudly think we can carry all of that weight alone, like that five-year-old on Sunday.

The thing is, although Jesus does call on us to take up our cross and follow him, he does not expect us to do it alone! When we turn to Jesus for help, we will find that our cross is light. Just like that young child who found that that heavy rugged cross was "really light - like nothing" when his father took the weight of one end.

We are surrounded by God's loving care – through the spiritual support of the Holy Spirit and the tangible support of all those who are the hands of Christ around us. Perhaps this is especially so when we humbly admit that our cross is too heavy.

So this Lent, let us boldly take up our cross, know that Jesus will lessen the heavy weight, just as that father did with his son. Because while Jesus calls us to take up our cross and follow him -- follow him all the way to the cross -- he also reminds us that he that his yoke is easy, and his burden is light (Matt 11:30), and that he is with us always (Matt 28:20).


In life we are always accompanied by Jesus. Jesus who carried his cross all the way to his death on Good Friday and was then freed from it in the resurrection of Easter morning.

#### **News From St. Luke's Creemore**

Blessings to everyone.

I hesitate to say "what lovely spring weather we are having" for a couple of reasons. Most importantly I strongly believe that whether we acknowledge it or not, an early spring distracts us from our Lenten practices. So I hope we are all vigilant in our practices during most Holy season.

Due to inclement weather our workshop on budgeting was cancelled in February. We are pleased to announce that this will be presented on Saturday April 13, 10-12. Sharon McCormick from the United Way we be our facilitator. Sharon has worked in communities as a volunteer and now as a United Way facilitator. #### NEWS FROM THE PARISH OF ALL SAINTS

History Bites....our new church archivist, Mary Lou Dunn, tells us interesting details about the building material for our historic church building. She mentions that some of the stone may have originated in the quarry on Ontario Street in Collingwood....on the current site of the Legion Building...and while I was not around when the area was a working quarry, I vaguely remember the 'very large swimming hole' when I was quite young...



History Bites: The church that was later named All Saints' had the English style of a steeply pitched roof. The low walls were clad with an attractive natural stone in various shades of grey with buff coloured corner stones. The carved stone blocks were dressed with limestone that was blended with crushed granite. This unusual covering made of local field stone is referred to as random rubble stone. Throughout the area, it is difficult to find any other stone buildings similar to the church with the exception being the rectory that was built at a later date. Top photo is the transept wall of the church. Middle photo is parish hall wall and bottom is the rectory wall. The present Legion grounds are situated over the old Batteaux Quarry. It is possible that some of the rubble stone came from that quarry.

• Our next Rector's Book Study will continue our focus on C.S. Lewis by looking at his book, The Screwtape Letters, A junior devil, who is not very good at his job, receives advice from a senior devil, Screwtape, on how to tempt humans and lead them away from their faith. As he advises his young apprentice, "But do remember, the only thing that matters is the extent to which you separate the man from the Enemy (the devils' name for God). It does not matter how small the sins are provided that their cumulative effect is to edge the man away from the Light and out into the Nothing. Murder is no better than cards if cards can do the trick. Indeed the safest road to Hell is the gradual one—the gentle slope, soft underfoot, without sudden turnings, without milestones, without signposts."

The Screwtape Letters is a modern Christian classic and is full of insights on what genuine and lifegiving faith looks like. You can purchase it from the bookseller of your choice, and we will meet to discuss it in late April, date to be announced.
