

Thank you so much for your patience and support as we have worked to enhance our worship space, in the church and online.

Over the last few months you will have noticed new TV monitors, new speakers in the ceilings and new microphones that will allow our AV team to pick up the sound of our joyful singing! These last three weeks, as we have worshipped in the parish hall, the work has continued; some of the work is highly visible and other hidden!


While the carpet was made possible thanks to a generous bequest, donations are still being accepted for the other projects and we do appreciate your generous support.

# Remembering St. Athanasius, "The Father of Orthodoxy"

Imagine being fired from your job and chased out of town, not once, not twice, but five times! That would get rather discouraging, and make one doubt one's life choices, unless that person is St. Athanasius, whose feast day we celebrate today, 2 May.

Athanasius was born in Alexandria, Egypt, around 298 AD, in the last days of the pagan Roman Empire. He came from a wealthy family, received a good classical education, and was a committed Christian. By the time he was ordained a deacon in 319, the persecutions were over and the Emperor Constantine had declared Christianity as the official religion of the Empire.

However, Christianity in those days looked a lot like a bare knuckles bar fight. A priest in Alexandria named Arius began a massive theological controversy when he declared that Jesus was made like any other creation of God, albeit made before all other things were made. Athanasius, however, held that while Jesus was "begotten" (past tense of the old world "beget"), meaning that he was the *Son* of God, Athanasius also maintained that Jesus' was "coeternal", meaning that there had never been a time when he was not the Son of God.

By the time Athanasius became the bishop of Alexandria in 328, Arius had been excommunicated for his views, but Arius' powerful friends included emperors and bishops. The Arian party managed to depose Athanasius and send him into exile on five separate occasions, but Athanasius stuck to his guns and so earned the nickname "Contra Mundum", or Athanasius against the world. Athanasius ultimately prevailed, and died peacefully as Bishop of Alexandria in 373.

Today these disputes seem like ancient history, but the church owes Athanasius it's gratitude because it's important to try to speak with precision, even about divine mysteries. The phrases "Begotten, not made" survives in the Nicene Creed because of Athanasius, who rightly insisted that if Jesus was merely a creature, like us, then how could he save us? A longer statement about the nature of Christ and the Trinity is called The Athanasian Creed, and it is included in the old Book of Common Prayer (p. 695) though it is seldom heard in churches today.

So, if you're ever convinced of the rightness of your cause, but feel like giving up because it seems hopeless, say a prayer to St Athanasius, whom we remember today as "The Father of Orthodoxy".

#### Some More on Julian of Norwich, Golden Halo Winner

In our last ASA, I promised a little more on Julian of Norwich, the 14th century English mystic and woman writer who was the winner of this year's Lent Madness competition.

In 1373 she had a series of visions, which she called Showings, that were written down in a book called The Revelations of Julian of Norwich. She's been described as a mystic who was down to earth and realistic about the human condition even though her "heart and mind are so utterly in heaven".

In one of her writings, she described how we are "Enfolded in God":

"For as surely as we owe our being to the endless strength of God, to his endless wisdom

and his endless goodness, just as surely we owe our safekeeping to the endless strength of God, his endless wisdom and his endless goodness.

"For though we poor creatures feel debates and strifes within ourselves, yet we are all mercifully enfolded in the gentleness of God, in his kindness, in his benignity, in his goodwill.

"For I saw full surely that every good thing - our endless friendship, our dwelling place, our life and our being - are all in God."

I pray that all who read this are encouraged by Julian's wise words, and feel enfolded in God's love.
