On Saturday, November 2nd at 7pm, at All Saints, Collingwood, we will again observe the Feast of All Souls, also known in the church as The Commemoration of the Faithful Departed.

This is the time of the church year when we are called to give thanks for

the lives of the saints and loved ones gone before us, and to pray for their repose until we are reunited with them in God's eternal presence.

All are welcome to this communion service, which will use the liturgy for Holy Communion from the Book of Common Prayer. It will be a sung service using the traditional communion music from Merbecke. Please be aware that some incense will be used during this service.

All are invited to bring a photo or portrait of those who are on your hearts at this time, and we will gather them together before the service begins.



Please remember to 'fall back' on November 2nd. We turn our clocks and watches back an hour. If you forget, you are most welcome to help out getting the coffee and church ready for the service that Sunday morning when you arrive as you will have a little extra time on your hands!




Our annual Service of Remembrance will take place on November 10th at 9:30 a.m.

Mary Lou Dunn, our church Archivist, tells us about the first Anglican service in Canada....

The first known service in what is now Canada was performed by Robert Wolfall, a chaplain in Sir Martin Frobisher's expedition, in Frobisher Bay (Iqaluit) on 2 September 1578. The chaplain was "'Maister Wolfall (probably Robert Wolfall), minister and preacher', who had been charged by Queen Elizabeth 'to serve God twice a day" Thereafter Anglicanism spread through immigration from the British Isles and the coming of Loyalists, many of whom were Anglicans, after the American Revolution

The Rev. Robert Wolfall was vicar of the Parish of West Harptree, Somerset, when he became chaplain to Martin Frobisher's third Arctic expedition to Canada. On 3 September 1578, Rev'd Wolfall presided at the first recorded Holy Eucharist in what is now Canadian territory: Frobisher Bay, Baffin Island.



Father Michael tells us about the church's "Patronal Festival"....

In The Company of the Saints: A Reflection for the Feasts of All Saints and All Souls

Dear Saints:

Very soon now we will be approaching our patronal festival, meaning the day of the calendar and of the church year for which a church is named. Thus, our friends in Creemore had their patronal festival on Oct 18, the Feast of St Luke, and our festival, the Feast of All Saints, is of course 1 November. By the way, if you're wondering, the church term "feast day" comes from the Latin word festes, meaning "joy", so a feast day is a day of celebration (and not necessarily, a day for a grand meal, though that is always an option!).



I suppose one could feel two ways about a church named All Saints. Some might think the term indecisive, a compromise because the church founders couldn't agree on a particular saint or holy figure and so chose a more generic name, hedging their bets, so to speak. I prefer to think of the name "All Saints" as being inclusive, because it reminds us that we live in the midst of the company or communion of saints.

The term "saints" casts a big net, including everyone from biblical figures (disciples and apostles) to martyrs to canonized or recognized saints (St Francis, for example) to the unrecognized saints over the ages (those known only to God) to those persons, living and passed away, that have strengthened and guided our own faith lives and kept us company on the way. In other words, to name a hymn that our own Maestro Barry is fond of, the saints are "the friends of God". In that sense, we are all saints!

On November 1 we remember all these saints and give thanks for their lives and examples. In the lovely words of the Letter to the Hebrews, we are "surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses" (Heb 12.1). We speak of the communion of saints when we pray the Apostles' Creed, thus reminding ourselves of the spiritual unity of all Christians, living and dead. I speak of unity because, as St Paul writes, "nothing can separate us from the love of God" (Rom 8.31-39). A faithful parishioner once told me that when she comes to the communion rail, for a moment she steps out of time and space and is the presence of all Christians who are the body of Christ. It's a wonderful and mystical thought.

The idea of our being united with the dead in the company of saints brings me to some final thoughts about the companion feast, All Souls, celebrated on November 2. All Souls specifically remembers those we call the faithful departed, those we love but see no more in this earthily life. On All Souls we do not pray to the dead, or even for them. The Reformers taught long ago that the dead have no need of our prayers, since the grace and love of God has already brought them to rest and glory. I see All Souls as a way to pray in thanksgiving for the dead, but also as a time to ask God's comfort for the aches and sadnesses that never quite leave those of us who grieve. All Souls is thus as much for our reassurance as it is an opportunity to give thanks for the time we had with those we love.

We will gather on Saturday, 2 November, to keep the Feast of All Souls and all are welcome to come. Last year some found it helpful to bring a photo of loved ones who have passed, and you are welcome to do that again. We will collect the photos together before the service begins. Once again we will hear the solemn and wonderful words of the Book of Common Prayer, and this year we will use a small amount of incense during the service, so please bear that in mind. Our guest preacher will be the Rev. Canon Carol Bateman.

What Is The Season of Spiritual Renewal?



Earlier in 2024, Andrew, Bishop of Toronto, declared a two year Season of Spiritual Renewal (SSR) that would run until Epiphany, 2026. A focus on "renewing spirituality" and deepening our "personal and collective discipleship" was the first call to action that arose from our diocesan visioning campaign, Cast the Net.

As Bishop Andrew explained, "My hope its that [this Season of Spiritual Renewal] will lead us to a deep and profound joy in the gospel of Jesus Christ and a sense of communities large and small feeling a part of a rekindling of the Anglican Church in the Diocese of Toronto".

Very briefly, the SSR project brings together a variety of resources to help individuals and parishes to be more intentional about prayer, engagement with scripture, worship, and discipleship and evangelism.

Sound scary? Well, as the angels like to say, be not afraid! The SSR team has put together a variety of resources that can all be found on the Diocese of Toronto website at https://www.toronto.anglican.ca/diocesan-life/season-of-spiritual-renewal/ You'll be hearing more about them in the weeks and months to come.

SSR runs a variety of one hour free online workshops (1 to 2 pm)on a variety of topics. The three coming this November are:

Nov. 14: Silence, Stillness, Simplicity: An Introduction to Leading Christian Meditation

Nov. 21: Equipping Parents as Spiritual Nurturers

Rev. Sharon informs us of some very important changes that have taken place at the General and Marine Hospital. Please make note of this information, especially if you are scheduled to be in the hospital or in case you are there due to an emergency.

VISITIING CHANGES AT CGMH - The clergy team was recently made aware of some changes that have happened at our local hospital. The major change is that the position of Chaplain has been replaced by a social worker. Though many local clergy have expressed concern over this decision, at the moment it is a "done deal" and there is no recourse. Some of the local clergy have agreed to remain as "on call" chaplains but will only go in if requested. A second change which affects us is that there is no longer a listing of denominations held at the front desk. We used to be able to access the locked drawer, read over our list, and see if any of "our" people were admitted. This is no longer possible, due to privacy concerns. This has also meant that our pastoral visitors are no longer given access either, and their privileges have been suspended.

What does this mean for our parishioners? We have no way of knowing if you are a patient. Only if you, or a family member, call the office, will we know to come and visit. In an emergency, and only if requested, the staff are able to call the designated cleric on call. Please keep this in mind should you become a patient. Please let us know. We as a clergy team have provided support to patients, and will continue to do so, if we are aware that we have someone admitted.
