Welcome back to All Saints Alive! Well, this time next week, the celebrations will have ended, gift wrap will have been placed in re-cycling (hopefully!), Christmas carols and songs will just be faded memories in our minds....but the good news is that 'Christ is Born', and our new church year lies ahead.

Mary Lou Dunn, our church archivist, shares with us, a special part of Christmas history....

British and German troops meeting in No-Man's Land during the unofficial truce

The Christmas Truce has become one of the most famous and mythologised events of the First World War. But what was the real story behind the truce? Why did it happen and did British and German soldiers really play football in no-man's land?

Late on Christmas Eve 1914, men of the British Expeditionary Force (BEF) heard German troops in the trenches



opposite them singing carols and patriotic songs and saw lanterns and small fir trees along their trenches. Messages began to be shouted between the trenches.

The following day, British and German soldiers met in no man's land and exchanged gifts, took photographs and some played impromptu games of football. They also buried casualties and repaired trenches and dugouts. After Boxing Day, meetings in no man's land dwindled out.

The truce was not observed everywhere along the Western Front. Elsewhere the fighting continued and casualties did occur on Christmas Day. Some officers were unhappy at the truce and worried that it would undermine fighting spirit.

Father Michael continues our journey in history from Mary Lou's recount of Christmas Eve in 1914....in 1918, almost four years to the date, the very first 'Lessons and Carols Service' was held as a memorial to the men and women who were killed in WW1. Father Michael shares with us the special 'Bidding Prayer', written for that first service by the Dean of King's College in Cambridge.

The Story of the Service of Carols and Lessons and What It Offers Us

On Sunday, December 29th, our combined worship at 10:30am with the other three churches in our regional ministry will feature a service of Carols and Lessons. Normally this service is held during the Advent season, but our music director, Barry De Silva, has offered us the option of having Carols and Lessons as a post-Christmas celebration (and also a break for tired preachers as our service has no sermon).

You might be surprised to learn that the Carols and Lessons service is a fairly recent invention in the Anglican tradition, celebrating its one-hundredth birthday only last year in 2018. It was constructed out of the grief and horror of the First World War, which had ended only 6 weeks before Christmas Eve in 1918.

The service was invented by the Rev. Eric Milner-White, a graduate of King's College, Cambridge, who had served as a British Army chaplain during the war. After he returned to King's College as its Dean, Milner-White wanted to create a memorial to the men of the College killed in the war, but also as a way of reimagining the Christian message for people whose faith had been severely challenged by the trauma of the Great War.

As part of the service, Milner-White wrote a "Bidding Prayer" which begins like this:

Beloved in Christ, in this season of Advent, let it be our care and delight to prepare ourselves to hear again the message of the Angels, and in heart and mind to go even unto Bethlehem, to see the Babe lying in a manger. Let us read and mark in Holy Scripture the tale of the loving purposes of God from the first days of our disobedience unto the glorious Redemption brought us by his holy Child, and let us look forward to the yearly remembrance of his birth with hymns and songs of praise...

As Ashley Tumlin-Wallace writes in The Anglican Compass, this prayer "does not retreat from the world". Its second part invites our prayers for the needs of the world:

let us pray for the needs of his whole world; for peace and goodwill over all the earth; for the mission and unity of the Church for which he died, and especially in this country and within this city. And because this of all things would rejoice his heart, let us at this time remember in his name the poor and the helpless; the hungry and the oppressed; the sick and those who mourn; the lonely and the unloved; the aged and the little children; and all those who know not the Lord Jesus, or who love him not, or who by sin have grieved his heart of love.

Lastly, let us remember before God his pure and lowly Mother, and all those who rejoice with us, but upon another shore and in a greater light, that multitude which no one can number, whose hope was in the Word made flesh, and with whom, in this Lord Jesus, we for evermore are one."

Ashley writes that: "If Eric Milner-White could delight in Christ in the midst of a World War, each of us can find hope in Chris in the midst of our struggles.

As you enter into the season of Advent, maybe you feel overwhelmed, tired, or just distracted and anxious by all that needs to be done. Maybe, like me, you need to hear this bidding prayer – this invitation once again to let it be our care and delight in this holy season to prepare our hearts and homes for the coming of our Saviour, the Lord Jesus Christ."

Come to All Saints on Sunday December 29th at 10:30 and hear this remarkable service and prayer; may it also be your care and delight!
