From Reverend Michael Peterson

The Rector and Wardens give notice that there will be a Special Meeting of Vestry immediately after church on Sunday, April 27th, to approve details regarding the sale of the surplus of cemetery property. The wording of the motion is available at the back of the church, on the church website, or by request.

This motion updates and replaces a motion passed at an All Saints Special Vestry in 2022. During the sermon time on April 27th, the rector and wardens will speak about the motion and provide an update as to where we are with the sale process."

The Rev. Dr. Amy Pauley, the Curate of our Regional Ministry, will be ordained a priest in Christ's Holy, Catholic, and Apostolic Church, here at All Saints on Friday, 2 May, at 7pm, by the Right Reverend Riscylla Shaw, Suffragan Bishop of Toronto. There will be a reception after the service. If you can help with the service or with reception, please speak to Fr. Michael."

Confirmation Classes to Be Offered

Confirmation in the Anglican Church used to be reserved for young adults, as an equivalent to the Roman Catholic practice of First Communion. Today confirmation is offered for baptized people of all ages who would like to do one or more of the following:

Deepen one's faith and knowledge of core Christian beliefs (the catechism). **Learn** more about the Anglican tradition (useful if you came from another church tradition and wonder why we do things the way we do).

clergy team is planning The confirmation course for young adults and for adults of all ages, starting in May and running through May, June, and September. It will be open to members of all churches in our Regional Ministry. The course will begin with a shared meal, then move to zoom with occasional in person events and end with another shared meal. It will end in October with a confirmation service attended by our bishop.

What is the Sacrament of Healing? Like all sacraments, the anointing with oil is 'an outward and visible sign of an inward and spiritual grace'. The sign of the cross is made on your forehead, using oil that has been blessed at a special annual service at the Cathedral. A prayer is said along with the anointing. The prayers may differ somewhat, but the prayer will usually contain something like the following:-

"______, through this holy anointing, may our Lord in His love and compassion uphold you by the grace and power of His Holy Spirit, and may you be

restored to fullness of life, in body, mind and spirit. In Jesus' name. Amen"

When is this Sacrament offered? Anointing is regularly offered at the prayer desk near the font during communion time most Sundays. One may also request anointing at other times, at the church, in your home or in hospital.

Who can offer this Sacrament? Father Michael, Rev. Sharon or one of the lay people trained and licenced by the Bishop-- Moira Southwell, Marie Phipps-Bunting, Greg Goldsworthy or Sharon Goldsworthy.

Do I need to tell the anointer why I am there? Some find it helpful to verbalize their need aloud and the anointer may invite you to do so, however, there is no requirement to do so. Your request can be private between you and God.

What role does medicine have in this process? We hold strongly to the belief that as much as God uses prayer and grants miracles, God also uses medicine and counseling. Prayer and healing should not be pitted against medicine and counseling.

Trust God with the results. God's timing and God's ways don't always coincide with our expectations, however, we can trust God to bring us to a place of wholeness and peace. We need to remember that healing and curing are not the same. A cure is a medical fact, but healing goes deeper and touches the soul and spirit.
