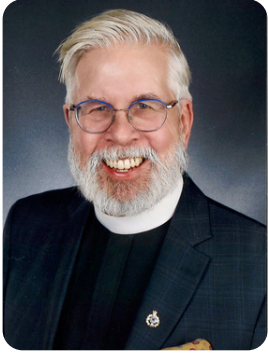
We are now almost at the end of August and with the official start to the autumn season less than a month away, let's embrace the warmth of the summer sun while we still can.

Clergy Team Appointments

In August our own Bishop Riscylla made several welcome announcements.

The Revs. Sharon and Bryce Sangster have been appointed as honourary assistants for the Regional Ministry of South Georgian Bay. This type of appointment is typically given to retired clerics. It is a sign of trust in their ministry and character, and is given in gratitude to priests who continue to serve God's people, so we thank Sharon+ and Bryce+ for their continued service.



The Rev. Amy Dr. Pauley has been appointed as a full time Regional Associate Priest, starting 1 September. This position is made possible in part through a generous Diocesan grant running five years, and also by All Saints and Prince of Peace agreeing to share the remaining cost. Amy+ is a talented and devout priest and a wonderful colleague and we are delighted that she will stay as part of our regional clergy team.

Introducing Creation Church

Warden Catherine reports that the wardens, staff and volunteers have had a very busy summer at All Saints. Many improvements and additions have occurred during the past couple of months and Catherine has shared with us, all these wonderful changes.

A Busy Summer at All Saints

It has been a busy summer here at All Saints! There has been a lot happening behind the scenes to care for our buildings, improve our facilities, expand our rental opportunities, and prepare for the future. Here are some of the highlights.

Property Update

A big thank-you to our Property Manager, **Robert Pearce**, for all his hard work this summer!

- **More parking:** Robert has extended the parking lot, adding **four new parking spaces** at the north end. Depressions in the existing lot have also been filled and new screening has been applied.
- **South entrance ramp:** Repairs are underway, including new railings and concrete repairs to make the entrance safer and more welcoming.
- **Parish Hall sound and projection:** A new backboard has been installed on the stage wall in preparation for our new **drop-down projection screen, projector and integrated sound system.**

A Busy Summer at All Saints Continued...

This is the next phase of our sound-system improvements. The upgraded Parish Hall will allow us to accommodate a wider range of rental groups looking for a well-equipped meeting and event space. Eventually, the system will also allow us to connect the Parish Hall with the church for large events and overflow seating.

- **Basement improvements:** The basement has had a much-needed clean-out. An east-side wall that had been damaged by moisture was dried out, repaired and re-drywalled. We also addressed the root cause: inadequate eavestroughing in that area. New eavestroughing has now been installed to direct water away from the foundation.
- **Church and Parish Hall:** Ceiling fans have been cleaned and new bulbs installed.
- **Grounds:** Dead and overgrown trees and shrubs have been removed.
- **Washroom:** An automatic flush has been added to the men's washroom urinal.
- **Painting and repairs:** Patchwork and painting are currently underway in the Parish Hall and hallway.

We are very grateful to **Robert Pearce** and to everyone who has generously contributed toward our summer capital work. Your support is helping us care for our buildings and prepare All Saints for the future.

Rentals & Community Use

Our rental activity continues to grow!

A wonderful children's group rented our basement in July and was thrilled with the space. We are also pleased to continue welcoming **The Nature League, the Blue Mountain Club of the Bruce Trail, AA, and Fleetwood Dance Company** to our facilities.

Please keep your eyes and ears open for groups, organizations or individuals looking for rental space. Every new rental helps provide an important source of revenue for the church.

We have also been advertising the Rectory as a retreat space through social media and through the newsletters of the Dioceses of Toronto and Huron. We are hopeful that this will develop into another valuable opportunity for All Saints.

Cemetery Sale Update

We did receive an offer in the spring, but unfortunately the deal fell through because we were not able to have the property serviced by the Town within the required timeframe.

In addition, approval from the Ministry is required for our archaeological study, and we are still awaiting that confirmation.

The good news is that the land is now serviced, and John Kirby continues to work with several potential buyers.

Our Move to You tube - Who Will Be in the 2035 Video?

Over this summer we have increased our social media presence with personal video testimonials and photos of all our Saints in action. We have also made the move to put our live stream and recorded service discoverable on our own YouTube channel. This move means people don't need to come through our website to find our service or even know who we are, but they can find a service and watch and become curious about us.

In the process of moving our recorded services to YouTube we came across some older videos of the church.

As I watched one of them, two things struck me. The church and choir stalls were packed, and yet I recognized fewer than five people. When I checked the date, I was surprised to discover that the video was from 2017—less than ten years ago.

It made me wonder: if we fast-forward to 2035, what will a video of All Saints on a Sunday morning look like?

We have much to celebrate. We are out in our community, serving others, building relationships and living out our call to be the hands of Christ in the world. That is an important part of who we are. Through our worship, outreach, pastoral care, music, food ministry, we are demonstrating our faith in very real ways.

But part of that calling is also invitation.

For All Saints to continue to be a vibrant worshipping community, we need to invite new people to discover us, welcome them when they arrive, and help them find a place of belonging here. Growing our parish isn't simply about filling pews. It is about ensuring that the faith, fellowship, service and community we value today are here for others tomorrow.

And that is something each of us can help with. Sometimes evangelism is as simple as saying to a friend, neighbour or someone new to the community, "Why don't you come with me on Sunday?" Something to think about for welcome back Sunday September 20, 2026.

So perhaps the question isn't whether the All Saints of 2035 will look like the All Saints of 2017. It won't—and it doesn't need to.

The more exciting question is: Who are the Saints we haven't even met yet?

They may be people who responded to your invitation or who found us through YouTube or social media. They may come through one of our outreach ministries or community events. They may be a neighbour, a friend, a grandchild or someone who simply walked through our doors one Sunday.

Our task is to make sure they know the door is open—and that there is a place for them here.

Our resident historian and archivist, Mary Lou Dunn, has been researching the many historical events that have taken place at the Mount of Olives. In this first of series, she tells about the Garden of Gethsemane in Jerusalem.

Mount of Olives is the site of many historic happenings throughout the bible. This will be the first presentation of those holy events.

Gethsemane is a historic, olive-bearing garden on the western slope of the Mount of Olives in Jerusalem. Revered as the site where Jesus prayed and was arrested the night before his crucifixion, its name is derived from the Aramaic for "oil press," symbolizing the intense pressure he endured. Wikipedia +3The site is a major Christian pilgrimage destination featuring several key points of interest, including: The Ancient Olive Grove: The garden is home to some of the oldest documented olive trees in the world, with scientific testing revealing some root systems date back to the 12th century.
